In this fine study, Dr. Mikio reveals a little-known story of collaboration between a few missionaries and Japanese Christians to address human rights abuses perpetuated in Okinawa by the United States during the Cold War. Although results were limited, and heroes were few, this case study illustrates why cross-cultural partnership and prophetic witness remain essential to missional faithfulness.
